450 idiots in Parliament, thousands of 'retired politicians' and an entire group that call themselves 'Senators'


The ATO stated that the response he gave was "unacceptable."


As shown below, gates posed no problem for the expedition Leader. The new battery powered angle grinder certainly came in handy!



Leatherwork Introduction

Gill Spark (local resident) works with Leather and is prepared to give an introductory talk on the subject for members who might have an interest in having a go at it.

Gill is originally trained as a jeweller while living in the UK. Made the switch to leather after renting some workshop space in a leatherworkers studio and ended up working for him for about three years. Now mostly focused on leather with a little bit of silversmithing on the side. Been in the Kiewa valley about six years now operating out of my home workshop.

Gill runs leatherwork courses where attendees: learn basic leather making techniques including types of leather, tools to get started, cutting and burnishing, basic hand stitching including saddle stitching and basic pattern making.

He does not do any tooling which is the traditional leather stamping/carving technique.


